
- Please note that, while this project does not include new additions, it addresses areas that are truly in need of attention. The pictures displayed later in this newsletter will demonstrate examples.

# CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT 2024

On December 10, 2024, Ellicottville Central School District residents will have an opportunity to vote on a \$4,530,000 capital project that is being proposed to implement various health, safety, asset preservation, and building integrity improvements at our buildings and facilities. The majority of the proposed project will be paid for using available State Building Aid. The remaining cost will be fully offset through the application of retiring debt payments from past capital improvements.

As a result, there will be **NO ADDITIONAL TAX INCREASE** to residents and business owners as a result of this project.

We encourage you to learn more details about the project at the Public Hearing on Wednesday, December 4, at 6:00 p.m. in the High School Library.

## Why is this work needed?


The Ellicottville Central School District is committed to providing a safe learning environment and well-maintained facilities for students and public use. All school districts are required by New York State to have a licensed Architect review the condition of their buildings and grounds every five years. In 2023, our architectural consultant performed a Building Condition Survey (BCS) that examined the District's facilities and identified problem areas requiring reconstruction or replacement. A District subcommittee studied the BCS items and developed a prioritized list of recommended improvements. The District is addressing those issues now, rather than delaying and facing future higher costs and further deterioration.

## Why is the District having a capital project vote?

Routine facility maintenance and repairs are typically funded within the annual District budget, with local taxpayers bearing the full cost. However, large renovations, reconstruction, and replacement of "end of useful life" items, such as those included in this project, would have a major impact on the tax rate if included in the annual District budget. A capital project is a fiscally responsible alternative because State Building Aid reimburses a majority of the cost, providing the opportunity to keep some of the state's tax dollars in our own community.





### Project Financing Plan

**Project Cost: \$4,530,000    Additional Tax Increase: \$0**

This capital project is the next phase in the District's long range capital improvement financial plan, designed to sustain infrastructure of the District's buildings and enhance benefits to the community.

- ✓ New York State will provide the District with Building Aid that covers 65.1% of the cost, significantly reducing the local share.
- ✓ The project funding plan also leverages about \$180,000 in retiring debt resulting in a "TAX NEUTRAL" proposal to taxpayers.

During the playoffs, Ellicottville faced Number 11 seed Maple Grove on our home court. In quick fashion, we won in 3 games and then headed on the road to face our next opponent, the number 3 seed Panama. After losing a tight match to them just 2 weeks previously, we knew what to expect. These tenacious Lady Eagles were meeting up daily during lunch to watch film and make a game plan to get redemption on this team. And we did! We swept them in 3 games! Next stop was a trip out to

face the number 2 seed Westfield. This is a team we had not faced all season, but who had beaten us in playoffs the year before. The Lady Eagles showed up and beat Westfield in three games! This next part of the journey was going to be another tough battle. For the Section 6 Championship game, we were going to face the number 1 seed Clymer. This is a team that we had already beaten twice in our regular season, but those wins did not guarantee anything come playoff time. We knew we would have to fight for every point. Clymer showed up and gave us a battle! We fought for every point and beat Clymer in 3! Section 6 Champions! ## Dear Parents and Guardians,

Most days, a vast majority of my students come to the reading classroom without having done their reading practice. Six years ago, when I wrote an article for the fall newsletter, that percentage was about half. About half of all students receiving a reading intervention were doing reading practice with their families at night. Since COVID, this number has plummeted. Now, it is only a few families that do the reading homework.

I ask students to practice the books I teach during reading lessons in the evenings at home. Students are asked to read a book three times and come to class the next day having “mastered” it. Practice is necessary for a reading intervention to take full effect. Without the practice, my teaching skills are greatly diminished. We may not be able to get that child to grade level. We will certainly have a much more difficult job.

My students have always been apologetic in years past, saying something like, “I didn’t do my reading practice last night because we were too busy.” I have heard it hundreds and hundreds of times in the past ten years. Nowadays, they are not apologetic. Instead, they may give a brief explanation, “I didn’t do my reading...” but they usually just shrug it off. Reading practice is not happening often for most, and that has become the norm. Keep in mind that elementary-aged students are dependent upon an adult to facilitate their reading practice. Without it, they are at a disadvantage.

I think that lack of reading practice is the case for many among our elementary-aged students, not just those receiving reading intervention.

I’m willing to bet that most of our families have similar challenges, trying to get everything done in the evenings. Often reading practice comes last on the list of priorities.

I would like to tell you, teacher to parent, what is most concerning to me. As children progress through the grades, they are tasked with reading text at grade level. When they are not able to keep up, they begin to struggle. Once the struggle begins, it puts extra stress on the child. That stress affects the child’s ability to learn, and so a cycle begins. As the work gets harder, the stress continues to increase, which may become very difficult to manage.

Please remember that your children’s work at school is preparation for their lives. Their education prepares them for the world of work, and work is very competitive. A deficit in reading ability will make it hard for them to compete for jobs. This will affect the quality of their lives.

When I feel frustrated that a child is not progressing well due to a lack of practice, I so often think that when a child does not practice, others are practicing. Others are getting stronger and more competitive and will likely have an advantage over those who do not. I want your children to have every advantage to compete later in their lives—to get the jobs they want, to realize their dreams.

I understand how hard it is to be a parent and how hard it is to get it all done. I’ve been there, and I regret that I did not do a better job. If you are not doing reading practice with your child, I would encourage


you to try some new strategies such as listening to your child read while you are driving or cooking. Please try to find family or friends who can listen to your child read as well. Older siblings are also a great idea, especially if they received help in reading. They are now more capable and can help their little brother or sister.

I am cheering for your child/children every day at school, and I want to see them succeed. I have been writing newsletters for well over a decade now, and I think they all have had to do with the lack of reading practice. I have not yet seen an uptick despite all my efforts over the years. Instead, practice continues to decline, and we are now in the single digits. I think I can count about five families who still get the job done. I fear that the rest of my students are at a disadvantage that we might still overcome. There must be a way to improve for the sake of the kids. Your kids are...well, you already know...everything.

Please, please give it some thought.




# An Exciting Afternoon at the NANNEN ARBORETUM


## JV Football




